In action items....

The Board approved the following:



1. Eleven students will be heading to Orlando, Florida, at the end of the month to compete at DECA's International Competition! Here is a picture of several student leaders advocating for the opportunity to travel. Thank you, **Mrs. Baber**, for your advocacy of our students!

2. The installation of security cameras for our Early Learning Center, Primary Center, and Intermediate Center. The money for this expense is a result of a grant we received from the state's Department of Justice.

3. The installation of new locking mechanisms in the ELC, PC, IC, and Middle School. Again, these dollars are borne from our successful grant application to the state's Department of Justice.

4. Furnishings for the new addition of the high school. After several months of touring showrooms, setting up mock classrooms for teachers/students, and lots of feedback we are moving forward with our selections. It was wonderful to have feedback from our Vikings every step of the way.

Tuesday, April 9, 6:30-8:00 pm at Mount Horeb Public Library Mount Horeb Area Schools Sets Community Listening Session to Discuss School Resource Officer

MOUNT HOREB, Wis., (April 1, 2019) – The Mount Horeb Area School District is interested in hearing the public's feedback about any potential partnership with the Mount Horeb Village for a School Resource Officer program. The Board of Education will be hosting a community forum on Thursday, April 18, from 6-7:30 PM in the Middle School, located at 900 East Garfield Street.

The District's superintendent, Dr. Steve Salerno, said, "The answer to whether an SRO program is right for Mount Horeb can only be found with the input of our community. The most impactful changes to our community have always been made by trusting citizens' input. Our community's standard for their schools shall serve as the guiding light in our reflections of what, if anything, is appropriate."

The format of the event will include a brief overview, followed by an open forum for parents, staff, students, and community members to share their insights, questions, and/or concerns. No decision has been made about the implementation of a school resource officer and none will be made at this forum. Salerno said, "We are simply attempting to seek the pulse of the community on this topic. Is it right for Mount Horeb?"

In a recent communication to families, the District noted that before 2016, the front entries to all schools were unlocked. Since then, all schools have implemented a two-way communication system to ensure only those with legitimate business are permitted entry. Director of Student Services, Brian Johnson, stated, "We have been training students and staff in best practices for addressing armed intruders. We have successfully obtained \$263,000+ in safety grant dollars from the state's Department of Justice. This will permit us to install security cameras in all buildings, new classroom locks, and protective film for our windows."
