Chromebook Pilot: Those of you with students in the fifth grade know your children have been regularly using Chromebooks as part of their learning. Members of our Intermediate Center teaching staff came to last night's meeting to <u>present about this</u> <u>year's pilot</u>. As you might imagine, a great deal of preparation and professional development went into making this year's initiative the success that it was. In fact, members of our fifth grade team have been working very closely with our sixth grade staff to ensure a successful rollup of the pilot during the 2019-2020 school year. A special note of thanks to Ms. **Melissa Gervasi** and Mrs. **Channing Liska** for so ably representing their colleagues. Of course, our gratitude is extended to our entire 5th grade team for blazing this new trail.



Technology Plan Update: We thought this would be a good

time to update the Board on efforts made to strengthen our technology infrastructure and increase the number of available devices. When we first approached the Board (two years ago) about allocating additional dollars in our technology budget we sought a "1:1 like" technology vision. Concurrently, we were concerned the SmartBoard technology (which was already in place) was reaching the end of its life cycle. Increasingly, these 5+year old machines were beginning to cost more to replace than their worth.

I am pleased to report a coordinated effort has been established to bring the Chromebook vision to fruition, and we are in the process of replacing SmartBoards with interactive and regular televisions which permit us to "cast" screen images. To the former, the Board approved the planned purchase of additional Chromebooks for our 6th grade launch beginning this September. <u>Here is a link to our original plan</u>.

Mount Horeb Area School District to Open Biotechnology Lab

MOUNT HOREB, Wis., (April 16, 2019) – The Mount Horeb Area School District is pleased to announce a significant contribution to their high school's instructional program. The Lesar Family Foundation has donated \$50,000 toward the District's biotechnology lab, as part of the District's ongoing \$38.5 million referendum project.

Superintendent Dr. Steve Salerno said, "One of our three main goals of the successful April 2017, referendum was to re-imagine 21st – century classroom learning environments. Having a first-of-its-kind biotechnology laboratory as part of our high school will only serve to enhance our students' learning experiences. This generous donation allows the District to possess the proper laboratory tools and equipment and is destined to catapult our existing curriculum to breakthrough levels. It also beautifully sets the stage for students' ongoing success in their postsecondary studies."

While the biotechnology class has been offered for the past 29 years, the dedicated laboratory will provide students with additional learning spaces to dig even deeper into their studies. Teacher Mr. Tom Lesar shared, "In addition to what you might typically see in a biotech lab [flow hoods (clean bench)], we are now able to purchase a growth chamber, a thermocycler, and a gene gun. This brings our students' learning to a whole new level."

The Lesar Family Foundation was established by Dave and Sherry Lesar. As a successful businessman, Dave has ties to the Mount Horeb region. Both he and his wife Sherry graduated from Mount Horeb High School. He said, "Our supportive and loving parents, Stan and Joyce Lesar, put six children and 6 plus grandchildren through Mount Horeb High School, and they inspired the Foundation to provide funding for the next generation of students to explore solutions through science in ways we have not even begun to imagine. The students of today are getting a leg up on the solutions needed for tomorrow."
