In discussion items, the Board heard updates about:


COVID-19 and Fall Planning:

Business owners know Public Health Madison and Dane County's <u>Forward Dane Plan</u> (page 9), requires organizations to develop protocols and practices in several key areas: facility cleaning, hygiene, protective measures, illness, and health reporting. <u>You may find draft versions of those documents here</u>. These have been created in partnership with most every Dane County School District and in consultation with Public Health Madison and Dane County.

Transportation remains a major driver in our fall planning (no pun intended). *If* we do not have the capacity to meet (or come near) PHMDC's *guidelines* for the suggested number of passengers (currently, 15 people) we will need to explore some unorthodox options.



- We may need to seek a moratorium for in-town riders (2 miles or less) who do not traverse hazardous pathways to/from school. This would free up much needed busing capacity. We're grateful to the vast majority of survey respondents who indicated they could make this work.
- The majority of those who so dutifully drive bus are retirees supplementing income and/or enjoy keeping busy. We are in the process of ascertaining fall availability. We need drivers If you want to drive bus, we provide paid training and favorable wages. Please call Mr. Brian Toth, Transportation Coordinator, at 608-437-7057 for details.
- We are beginning to identify areas that would permit ease of parent drop off/pick up of students.

- Long Range Facilities Plan Update: Mr. Dave Reed, Building Services Coordinator, provided updates to the Board about several of the capital projects occurring throughout the District. Here is a slideshow of the work so far.
- ➤ Information and Advocacy Report As you may know, the Board has a strategic plan, <u>Vision 2023</u>. In an effort to update the Board as to our status, we develop these reports. This month's report, <u>which may be found here</u>, focuses on two of the Board's indicators of success in meeting their goals:

Objective D: Implement cutting edge and innovative learning practices
